Prison Education Reduces Recidivism

Higher education significantly reduces the likelihood of formerly incarcerated individuals returning to prison. Many community colleges participate in Second Chance Pell, which provides financial aid to those seeking a fresh start through education. Since 2016, over 45,000 students have enrolled in this program and earned over 18,000 credentials.



Of the 6,000 students who took part in Second Chance Pell in 2023, 67% earned industry certificates, empowering them with specialized skills. Meanwhile, 27% achieved associate degrees, and an inspiring 5% graduated with bachelor's degrees, showcasing the program's diverse impact on educational advancement. James Elliott is a prime example of Second Chance Pell in action. After graduating with an Associate's Degree from Delaware Technical Community College, James graduated with honors from Columbia University.

Second Chance Pell is a dynamic collaboration, currently involving 163 colleges and over 200 prisons, spanning 49 states. This nationwide initiative is bridging the gap between education and opportunity for thousands of individuals. Since graduating from Columbia University, James Elliott interned for U.S. Senator Chris Coons and is currently applying for law school.
