More Jobs Require Education After High School



Community Colleges Build Pipelines to Local Industries

The demand for education beyond high school is increasing rapidly. U.S. employers now need a steadily growing number of people with the specialized knowledge high school doesn't provide. An estimated 70 percent of jobs will require a college degree, vocational training, or a technical certification by 2031. That number was 28 percent in 1973.



As technology evolves, **U.S. employers face a** significant skills gap – the difference between the skills and knowledge needed for open positions versus what job seekers offer. By 2030, the U.S. is projected to have a shortage of 6.5 million skilled workers because industries can't find employees with the necessary education and training. This is especially true in sectors like healthcare, IT, manufacturing, and skilled trades, where employees need advanced technical, analytical, and problem-solving skills. Approximately 80% of community colleges partner with local industries to offer career-focused programs providing education and training for in-demand jobs. These collaborations boost local economies by meeting workforce needs.
